BOATER'S CODE

Respectful boating guidelines from Safe Quiet Lakes

1. I will never operate my boat beyond the level of my skills.
2. I will be aware of and obey all laws and regulations governing operation of my boat.
3. I will operate my boat with caution and courtesy to others at all times.
4. I will minimize my wake impact on shorelines, docks, structures and people.
5. I will always steer well clear of other boats, swimmers and wildlife.
6. I will set a speed and heading that is safe and comfortable for my passengers and others on the water.
7. I will provide safety instructions and offer appropriate life jackets or PFDs to everyone who travels in my boat.
8. I will carry all equipment necessary to operate my boat safely and within the law.
9. I will not consume alcohol in my boat or allow my boat to be operated by anyone who is impaired.
10. I understand that boating is a shared experience and I will not create excessive noise or operate my boat in a manner that disrupts the peaceful enjoyment of the lake by others.



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On The Dock

Pork Tenderloin with Maple Pepper

Yield: Serves 6

Preparation Time: 5 minutes

Cooking Time: 15-20 minutes

- 2 Pork tenderloins, well trimmed about 12 oz.
(375 g) each
- 2 Tbsp (30 mL) maple syrup
- 3 Tbsp (45 mL) Dijon or grainy mustard
- 1 Tbsp (15 mL) Canola oil
- 2 tsp (5 mL) course black pepper

Combine ingredients and pour mixture over pork on all sides.

On BBQ: Preheat BBQ on high; reduce heat to medium. Place pork on greased grill and cover for 15 to 20 minutes or until internal temperature registers 155°F (68°C). Remove to a cutting board. Tent loosely with foil. Let rest 5 minutes before slicing.

Forest Health

- Beach bark disease is showing up extensively throughout Blackstone/Crane Lakes & the Healey Lake area.
- Hemlock looper is present in the Lake Muskoka and Lake Joseph area. This insect has a history of erupting quickly, and causing severe defoliation for 1-3 years, and then collapsing quickly. It has done this in the Georgian Bay area in the past.

Safe Quiet Lakes

The programs of the Safe Quiet Lakes (SQL) are based on public opinion. In 2013 this group, whose mission it is to improve safety and enjoyment of our treasured, shared resource, surveyed over 2300 people and found four common concerns:

1. Boats going too fast
2. Loud boat engines
3. Large wakes
4. Unsafe and considerate boating

This year, Safe Quiet Lakes supplied Healey Lake Property Owner's Association with 150 Boater's Code cards, free of charge. We made these available at the Regatta and they will be available again at the Association meeting in September. Be sure to get one of these and display it in your cottage or boat. (see p. 3)

With grants from Seguin Township and the Township of the Muskoka Lakes, SQL has made permanent large Boater's Code signs available – these are being installed at selected boat launches.



The Dragonfly

What is an Odonate? We see them daily on Healey Lake and all enjoy their presence. Well I am talking about dragonflies and there is something magical about dragonflies. Long before dinosaurs, the air was filled with dragonflies. There are reports of fossil dragonflies found with wingspans of up to two feet where now wingspan is only two to five inches since evolution. There are more than 5000 known species of dragonfly in the world.

Dragonflies begin as a nymph and both dragonflies and damselflies are found around ponds and lakes because they are aquatic. The females will deposit their eggs on the water surface or in aquatic plants or mosses. They will molt between 9 and 17 times before the dragonfly will be ready for adulthood.

In the nymph stage the damselfly breathes with gills at the end of its abdomen which are located inside its' rectum. It will pull water into its anus and when it expels the water it propels it forward. Newly molted adult dragonflies are very vulnerable and about 90% get eaten in the first few days. When they are finally ready for adulthood and molt for the last time their bodies are soft and pale. Until they harden they are a much weaker flier. However if they survive the first few days, they are masters of flight.

They have 4 wings all of which they can move independently. As well as flapping each wing up and down the dragonfly can also rotate its' wings forward and back on an axis. They are able to fly like no other insect. From straight up and down, backwards, stopping and hovering either at full speed or slow motion. They can fly about 50 km per hour in a forward motion.

Most adult dragon flies will only live for about 2 months while others will live up to one year. A dragonfly needs warmth to fly and you will

notice that they will often land when the sun goes behind a cloud. If they can't fly they'll starve because they only eat prey they catch while flying.


Dragonflies will catch their prey by grabbing it with their feet while in flight. Dragonflies eat insects and they are a great control of the mosquito population. A single dragonfly can eat between 30 to hundreds of mosquitoes per day.

The dragonfly's head is made up of nearly all "eye". They have incredible vision and they can see from all angles except right behind them. Their mouth is located on the underside of their head.

It is very difficult to determine the sex and age of a dragonfly. To determine the sex, experts look at the spots on the abdomen, the coloured area shaped like a grain of rice helps to determine the sex. To mate, the male will grab the female's head and the tip of their abdomens will attach and form a circle. This is referred to as the "wheel" formation. Some will mate in flight while others will land

briefly to complete this ritual. The female dragonfly may have multiple partners. The male dragonfly, after mating, will guard their female partners to ensure other males will not mate with her and may even go into "wing to wing" combat for any approaching males until she deposits her eggs in the water referred to as "oviposits".

Dragonflies that survive longer than a few months will migrate to warmer climates however little is known about their migration patterns. Scientists have been tracking them by attaching tiny transmitters to their wings. Some dragonflies will only migrate about 12 km per day while other types will migrate about 160 km per day.

#4 Families enjoyed day trips in the region. Neil Pocock chose basking in the Moon River Falls, 1984.






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
