THE 2024 COTTAGE WATCH PROGRAM

Program was cancelled this winter for safety reasons. We thank all of our wonderful volunteers for their time and effort commitments and look forward to more favourable conditions as the program resumes next year.

GENERAL UPDATES

The good news is that the electricity was much more reliable this winter. There were a few outages, but they were resolved within hours. The improvements to the system by Hydro One last summer were effective.

I attended the Federation of Ontario Cottagers Association (FOCA) annual meeting in early March. It is always well attended in person and by ZOOM. Almost 250 associations were represented. Ontario has a new Non-profit Corporations Act [ONCA]. As a result, all associations must prepare new articles of incorporation & by-laws (aka a "constitution") for the corporation and file these documents by October 1, 2024. FOCA has a template that associations can use and adapt as needed to local conditions. If any member of the HLPOA has legal or para-legal experience, we would welcome volunteers to review the requirements and prepare new articles of incorporation and by-laws for the HLPOA.

Many thanks to Debbie for preparing and distributing the Directory. It is many weeks of work to contact each member, make sure all the information is current, and to prepare the physical mailing.

INTERNET CONNECTIVITY

No doubt, you have seen the Bell and Pickard Construction vehicles around Healey Lake Road. Because of the Provincial Government's objective to make high-speed internet service available throughout Ontario, Healey Lake & Kapikog Lake are in the work area. The timeline for this project to be completed is 2025. There has been no word at all about the building of the tower between Healey Lake & Kapikog Lake.

HEALEY LAKE DAM

Last year the MNR&F did not action the repairs to our dam as promised. I have pressed the issue throughout the winter and have received written notice that the anticipated date for the building of a berm is this fall. I was not happy with the "anticipated" part of that update and have requested MNR&F documents showing the work has been budgeted for and that work will commence. I now have emails from the MNR&F with the engineering reports, budget approval and the date of work for Sept or Oct, 2024.

GOVERNMENT DOCKS

For those of you using the Kapikog Bay dock, this dock will be secured to make it less "wobbly". All the government docks will be equipped with Grab Bars (aka "Granny Bars") to provide mobility assistance for those getting into and out of boats at the dock.




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WILDLIFE UPDATE

Since making Healey Lake my permanent home, I've had the privilege of joining Aspen Valley Wildlife Sanctuary as a volunteer. Engaging in this role has proven immensely fulfilling, affording me the opportunity to actively participate in the rehabilitation and nurturing of injured and orphaned animals.

Additionally the Ministry of Natural Resources & Forestry (MNRF) publishes a wide array of information.



Each year, Aspen Valley receives over 1,000 injured or orphaned animals in need of specialized care. As one of the largest wildlife rehabilitation centers in Canada, located on a 460-acre property with 50 outdoor enclosures and 15 buildings, we are equipped to handle this task.

ENVIRONMENTAL UPDATE

What could be "considered a crime" in this case is not that we are failing to deal with climate change but that we know there are solutions, and many of us simply fail to act. We were lucky last year on Healey Lake – as we enjoyed a season with lots of rain and moderate temperatures. We may be in an area of that is buffered from some of the effects of climate change, but I would encourage Healey Lakers not to expect it to last. Unfortunately, two facts stick out – first, as a developed industrial country, we are primarily responsible for Global Warming and second, cottage life is often associated with a high carbon footprint both in travel and recreational activities.

For those willing to accept both the responsibility and challenge here are some things you can do to help.

- Do your carbon footprint assessment and determine offsets, implementing any measures you are able to
- Consider travel both to the cottage and on the water and how you might reduce fossil fuel use. The first solar powered pontoon boat may make its debut on our lake this year!
- Fireproof & storm proof your cottage especially if undertaking a new build project or even when considering renovations.

- Consider plant rich and reduce food waste (30% waste is the average)
- Take up canoeing, kayaking and paddleboarding or incorporate them into your recreational plans
- Be respectful of each other. Remember noise and light contamination can be an annoyance.
- Respect the shoreline and native species and nitrate/phosphate contamination in our lakes (algae blooms are no fun).

Be a good steward for our lake and most importantly, have a good and safe summer!

MOSQUITO UPDATE

Well Spring is finally here, and it will soon be time to be at the lake enjoying the outdoors with friends and family. One species that is always happy to welcome you back to enjoy the outdoors in late Spring is the "mosquito" that we see mostly from dusk to dawn. So I thought it might be interesting to know a bit more about this nasty "fly" that shares the outdoors with us and tends to annoy anyone who encounters one. There are more than 3,500 different species of mosquitoes around the world ready to bite and annoy their "prey" and mosquitoes have been around for approximately 400 million years, longer than the dinosaur. There are only two places in the world that are completely mosquito free: Antarctica and Iceland.

Like other insects/birds, adult mosquitoes, both male and female, feed on nectar from flowering plants and are considered pollinators. Just like bees or butterflies, mosquitoes transfer pollen from flower to flower as they feed on nectar, fertilizing plants and allowing them to form seeds and reproduce. They are an important piece of the food chain as well as serving as important prey for wildlife such as dragon flies, frogs, fish, turtles, bats and birds, including hummingbirds which rely on small flying insects and spiders as a primary food source.

It is the female mosquito that is the culprit that will also feed on human blood as well as blood from birds, small mammals, snakes and more. It is the female mosquito that also is able to spread diseases like West Nile Virus, heart worm disease in dogs and in other countries malaria. For most Canadians, the risk of getting West Nile Virus or serious health effects is very low.

Mosquitoes can live without blood for usually 2 to 3 weeks and don't "need" blood to survive. The reason for them biting is they need the blood for reproduction. The females need the protein in the blood to develop eggs. After mating, a male mosquito usually lives for about 3 to 5 days and a female mosquito can live as long as two weeks or more. After obtaining a full blood meal, the female will rest for a few days while the blood is digested, and eggs developed. Once fully developed the female will lay eggs and then resume looking for her next "victim" for their blood. The female lays her eggs every few weeks at night in stagnant water. Eggs can hatch in a little as an inch of standing water.

Water is essential for mosquitoes as that is usually where they make their habitat and hatch their eggs into larvae called wigglers. The wigglers feed on organic matter in that stagnant water and breathe oxygen from the surface. Shortly after, these wigglers develop into pupae which do not feed and are partially encased in cocoons. After a few days these pupae develop into adult mosquitoes. The process from being a wiggler to a pupae to an adult mosquito is about 10 days and then they are able to fly. The mosquito is a short distance flyer and can only travel 100-200 feet at a time looking for water containers for breeding. They actually live their entire life within this short range. They can only fly 1 to 1.5 miles per hour and are considered one of the slowest flying insects around despite their small body weight.

Mosquitoes have two compound eyes, like all other insects and these contain thousands of "six-sided lenses" that point in all different directions and move independently so no matter what direction they are moving they can see everything. They see shades of black & white as well as movement and rely on chemical & thermal receptors.

Mosquitoes don't have ears however they "hear" at distances that normally require ear drums but instead they have "hairs" that sense sound from air particles vibrating at certain frequencies. Most mosquitoes are dawn and dusk feeders. During the heat of the day most mosquitoes rest in a cool place and wait for the evenings to strike although if disturbed they will still bite during the day.

The carbon dioxide that humans and other animals produce can be detected by a mosquito from 75 feet away. The female mosquito will fly back and forth through the CO2 "fog" until she locates her victim. When a mosquito bites and sucks the blood from your body they leave you with mosquito saliva in your body. This saliva creates a mild allergic reaction and an itchy red bump. The saliva serves as a anticoagulant as without it the female mosquito might become clogged with blood clots.

A Few "Fun Facts" About Mosquitoes:

- 1) If you wear dark clothing it will make you an easier victim for bites.
- 2) The word 'mosquito' is Spanish for 'little fly'.
- 3) In 2011 the French did a study and found that drinking 3 cans of beer leads to 30% more mosquito bites....so beware beer drinkers!!!!
- 4) Pregnant women produce 20% more carbon dioxide which makes them easier for mosquitoes to detect.
- 5) Mosquito wings beat 300-600 times per second-that is why you hear the high-pitched BUZZZZZ.
- 6) Mosquitoes synchronize their wing beats with their mates, thus performing a "lover's duet".
- 7) They only need an inch of water to lay their eggs; get rid of bottle caps, empty pot plants, tires, anything that can contain water!!!
- 8) Mosquitoes don't travel far from their breeding spots so if you've been "bitten" there may be 300 more very close that are also looking to bite you.
- 9) Mosquitoes are weak fliers-set up a fan if you are outside; it'll restrict their flight path and make it harder to bite you.

The best way to control mosquito populations and prevent them from breeding is to remove all standing water which provides breeding sites and wear your mosquito repellant when outdoors at dusk or dawn!!! DON'T BE THEIR VICTIM !

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THE LAKED CHEF

SPICY SHRIMP TACOS WITH CILANTRO LIME SLAW

Prep Time: 30 Minutes | Cook Time: 10 minutes | Serves 2-3 With the summer months just around the corner, enthusiastic Grillers will be itching to fire things up - and this is a great, easy recipe that benefits from the intense heat of a hot grill!

INGREDIENTS

Cilantro Lime Sauce:

(Option: Costco sells a ready to use version that's amazing)

- □ 1/4 cup extra virgin olive oil
- □ 1/2 cup green onions (thin sliced on the bias)
- □ 1/2 cup chopped cilantro leaves
- 2 cloves minced garlic
- □ 1/2 teaspoon salt
- □ juice of 2 limes
- □ 1/2 cup sour cream or full-fat Greek yogurt
- □ 1/4 cup water (if needed, to thin sauce)

Shrimp Tacos:

- □ 1 lb. raw shrimp, peeled and deveined, tails removed (smaller ones work well here, aim for 31-40s or higher)
- □ Cajun spice mix I like McCormick's
- □ 2–3 cups shredded green cabbage
- 8 small corn tortillas
- 2 smashed avocados (or prepared guacamole)
- □ 1/4 cup Cotija cheese (crumbled feta works too)
- 2 limes cut into wedges for serving

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Sauce: Pulse all the sauce ingredients in a blender until mostly smooth. Add water if needed to thin.
- 2. Slaw: Toss a portion of the sauce (keep some in reserve to drizzle on top the tacos) with the cabbage let it marinate in the fridge so the flavours have time to come together.
- 3. Shrimp: Pat the shrimp dry with paper towels. Toss the shrimp in a small bowl with the spice mix to evenly coat. Heat the grill to medium high heat. Grill shrimp for 4-6 minutes, flipping occasionally, (use a wire basket or grill topper if shrimp are smaller and at risk of falling through the grill), until the shrimp are pink and just cooked. DO NOT OVERCOOK.
- Assembly: For the best result, add your ingredients in this order: avocado, cabbage slaw, then shrimp. Finish with Cotjia cheese, lime wedges, and extra sauce.

Serve this with a basket of (warmed) tortilla chips and a bowl of your favourite salsa – paired with a pitcher of your favourite margarita or an ice cold Modelo with a lime - Cheers!





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
